## 2014 AMRV RC&D Council Projects

#### **Cullman County**

Compete to Complete Awarded: \$6,000

**Total Project Value: \$30,000** 

After moving the baseball field at Good Hope High School in 2007 the field was never completed. Drainage issues made it impossible to host playoff games and tournaments. These issues were addressed. This was done by eliminating the lower areas in the field, adding sod, and a drainage system.

**Pond at Clarkson Covered Bridge** 

Awarded: \$25,000

**Total Project Value: \$25,000** 

The depth of the pond at Clarkson Covered Bridge had been lowered by sediment buildup. The Cullman County Commission used the grant to dredge the pond to a depth that can support the ecosystem. This will positively affect the wildlife and visitors to the pond.



#### **Environmental Education**



Awarded: \$4,500

**Total Project Value: \$15,800** 

The Cullman County SWCD used the funds to conduct environmental educational programs related to natural resources and agriculture. These programs include Teachers Workshops, Earthday, FAWN, and programs in area schools.

#### **Dekalb County**



**Schoolyard Habitat Program** 

Awarded: \$2,500

Total Project Value: \$2,500

One World Adventure Company and seventh grade students from Fort Payne Middle School used the funds to create wildlife habitats at the middle school. These habitats were used to educate students about water conservation and other environmental concepts.

Rescue Equipment Awarded: \$3,700

Total Project Value: \$Invaluable when used to

save a life.

Fischer Rescue Squad, Inc. purchased new rescue equipment using the funds provided. This equipment will help the squad conduct rescues in swift water and high/low angles. The equipment purchased will be used throughout the county and the areas nearby.



# Imagination Library Awarded: \$2,056.53

Total Project Value: \$2,556.53

Through the Dollywood Foundation the City of Rainsville used these funds to purchase books to combat illiteracy in children. Books are provided monthly at no cost for children ages birth to five years old.

#### **Water Quality Education**

Awarded: \$2,000

**Total Project Value: \$8,260** 

The Alabama Clean Water Partnership conducted educational programs using these funds. Programs like the Little River Canyon Wonders of Watersheds Festival, the Small Farm Rain Catch project, and rain barrel workshops. The purpose of these programs was to educate the public about watersheds and water quality.

#### **Jackson County**

**Bob Jones Community Center** 

Awarded: \$4,500

**Total Project Value: \$4,500** 

Woodville Parks and Recreations used these funds to restore the historic Bob Jones Community Center. The bricks of the building required sealing and painting due to deterioration.





#### **Community Garden**

Awarded: \$1,500

**Total Project Value: \$2,132** 

A Water Wheel Planter was installed to the community garden at Section High School. This Wheel reduced the amount of labor, allow for more planting, reducing waste during fertilization and watering. The produce is distributed throughout the community at no cost to recipients. Awarded: \$1,500 Total Project Value: \$2,132



Career Expo Awarded: \$4,500

**Total Project Value: \$13,000** 

A career fair for High School students was held. The Expo created awareness of career options for the students. The "Choices" program, an interactive decision making workshop, was presented to the students.

#### **Lawrence County**

Wildlands Fire Equipment

Awarded: \$2,280

**Total Project Value: \$2,280** 

The funds were used by the Hatton Fire Department to buy the equipment needed to extinguish wildland fires. This equipment enables the fire department to fight fires in areas that fire trucks cannot go.





North Courtland Community Park Awarded: \$2,600

**Total Project Value: \$5,000** 

The city of North Courtland used these funds to buy equipment for the community park. The park is in the beginning stages and these features will add appeal to the new park. The equipment includes a pavilion, picnic table, and basketball goals.

Community Wellness Awarded: \$4,500

**Total Project Value: \$4,500** 

The town of Hillsboro needed exercise equipment for the community park. New equipment was provided and were installed in

the park. Healthy lifestyle classes were held and citizens were encouraged to use the exercise equipment.



Awarded: \$2,000

**Total Project Value: \$2,000** 

ACES: Urban Affairs and New & Nontraditional Programs wanted to establish an educational program entitled "Urban Wildlife 101". This unique program educated participants on the basics of wildlife, such as habitat and biology.

#### **Limestone County**

**Smith Hollow Road Water Line** 

Awarded: \$10,000

**Total Project Value: \$62,582** 

The residents in the Smith Hollow area no longer have access to their spring due to property rights. The water line was extended by almost 3,500 feet. This project ensures that all residents in the area have access to safe drinking water.



#### **Cardboard Collection**

Awarded: \$2,000

**Total Project Value: \$5,000** 

Cardboard recycling collection areas were added to all county schools for more convenient recycling. This will increase the amount of cardboard going to a recycling center.

Water Festival Awarded: \$2,000

**Total Project Value: \$13,861** 

This festival was held by the Limestone County Water and Sewer Authority to educate fourth graders in the county on water conservation and what they can do to help. The students learned about groundwater and non-point source pollution.



Good Springs Senior Center Awarded: \$14,000 Total Project Value: \$21,876.77



This project created a safe environment for the seniors gathering at the senior center. The wheel chair ramp was not compliant with ADA standards and there was not a cover over the front



entrance.

#### **Madison County**

#### Changing Face of Agriculture Awarded: \$2,000



#### **Total Project Value: \$4,400**

The Madison County SWCD hosted this farm tour for educators and local legislators. The objective was to tour farms in the area and learn about the \$1.8B dollar industry.

#### Court House Security Awarded: \$10,000 Total Project Value: \$29,220

A new X-ray machine was bought by the Madison County Commission with the help of these funds. The old X-ray was outdated and did not provide enough security. The new scanner will help the courthouse stop prohibited items from entering the courthouse.

**Sparkman High School Biosphere** 

Awarded: \$2,250

**Total Project Value: \$20,000** 

These funds were used to add to the existing outdoor classroom. An observation pier, compost stations, and bog garden were all completed this year. The students played a huge part in the construction process. Several of the projects were completed by Eagle Scouts.

#### **Water Festival**

The purpose of the Madison County Drinking Water Festival is to educate the 4<sup>th</sup> grade children of the community about clean water and drinking water. Those who attended left the festival more knowledgeable about drinking water sources and will carry that knowledge for the rest of their lives. Awarded: \$2,000. Total Project Value: \$22,650

#### **Raised Bed Gardening**



Awarded: \$2,000

**Total Project Value: \$2,000** 

The funds provided to CASA aided in the addition of nine new raised beds for gardening. The Community Garden for the Elderly and Housebound uses the raised beds to grow fresh produce for low income seniors. The new raised beds will allow for better soil quality and lengthen the growing season.

#### Tuesday Farmers Market Awarded: \$1,500 Total Project Value: \$1,500

The Tuesday Farmers Market in Meridianville received these funds to assist with marketing opportunities. The efforts helped growers reach a wider market and sell more of their produce. This also is a huge benefit to consumers who received the opportunity to buy fresh food.

**Urban Farm** 

Awarded: \$2,250

**Total Project Value: \$7,000** 



Lincoln Academy located in Lincoln Village created a teaching garden for students and the community. A rain catch system and composting bin was installed along with raised beds and a drip irrigation system. The students work the garden with the proceeds going to the community.

#### **Marshall County**

Museum Repair Awarded: \$6,000 Total Project Value: \$6,000

Repairs were made to the building housing the tribal museum of the United Cherokee Ani-Yun-Wiya Nation's. After tornado damage to the building and the roof.

**Lola Boyd Wildlife Area Maintenance** 

Awarded: \$4,500

**Total Project Value: \$4,500** 

These funds were used by the Lola Boyd Center for Environmental Education to help with the operation of the facility. Maintenance and utilities were paid for and a maintenance worker was brought in to maintain the education areas.

#### **Morgan County**

#### **Founders Plaza Enhancement**



Awarded: \$30,000

**Total Project Value: \$100,000** 

The Parks and Recreation Department of the City of Decatur used the funds to add additional seating and green spaces to Founders Plaza. The area backs up to the soon to be completed amphitheater.

#### **Outdoor Education Program**



Awarded: \$601.53

**Total Project Value: \$601.53** 

This education program was held for Cedar Ridge Middle School children. Participants got the chance to learn new skills and gain knowledge of the outdoors while participating in outdoor activities such as hiking, biking, rock climbing and camping. Knot tying, navigation, and minor first aid were some of the skills taught.

Kids Farm Tour Awarded: \$1,820

Total Project Value: \$ 1,820

This tour was hosted by the Morgan County SWCD to let children of the area learn about farms. On this one day tour they saw different types of local farms and learned about their local agricultural community including where there food comes from.



**Swift Water and Flood Rescue** 

Awarded: \$3,250.

**Total Project Value: \$4,500** 



The Morgan County Rescue Squad needed a more effective way to conduct swift water rescues. They purchased a Rapid Deployment Craft for the use in swift water rescue.



**Earth Park** 

Awarded: \$2,732.83

**Total Project Value: \$3,500** 

Earth Park was established to show the importance of storm water management in urban settings but the park was in need of repairs.

Repairs to structures in the park were made and educational signs were replaced.

#### Area Wide

**Hoop House** 

Awarded: \$5,000

**Total Project Value: \$5,000** 

AMRV RC&D participated in a State wide initiative to install a hoop house in each RC&D area. Hoop houses were constructed at Tanner High School in Limestone County and at Brindlee Mountain High School in Marshall County. These house are used in Agriscience education programs. They allow for extended growing seasons of vegetable crops.

#### **New Land Access and Improvements**

Awarded: \$20,303

**Total Project Value: \$70,303** 

Hartselle Utilities donated additional adjoining acreage to AMRV RC&D. The funds were used to clear land, installing fencing and gates to create a new entrance. This will ensure that groups coming to WaterWorks will have a much safer entrance and exit from the facility.

#### **Board Staff Training**



Awarded: \$10,000 Total Project Value: \$10,000

This training was meant to educate board members of non-profits on various subjects related to their organizations. This training was used by RC&D groups at state, regional and national levels. The educational programs focused on problems the groups face and the different opportunities open to them.

**Increasing Outreach Capacity via Interns and VISTA** 

Awarded: \$1,500

**Total Project Value: \$3,000** 

Research and grant writing were identified as two of the largest needs many non-profits have. In conjunction with North AL Agriplex interns have been secured through the VISTA program to help in these much needed areas.

Wheeler Explorers Education Liability

Awarded: \$3,000

**Total Project Value: \$13,000** 

Liability insurance coverage was provided to protect the Wheeler Explorers program. The program is a water quality education program that educates on the basics of water management in canoes and kayaks.

**Increasing Outreach Capacity** 

Awarded: \$10,000

**Total Project Value: \$14,000** 

These funds went towards transportation for RC&D projects. A 2010 Ford Explorer was bought so that employees didn't have to drive their own cars. This allowed for more reliable transit to projects being conducted in schools or farms.

#### **Little Hands Big Heart**



#### Awarded: \$2,500 Total Project Value: \$26,537.50

This intergenerational project impacted the lives of not only the recipients of the quilts but also the children involved in

making them. Life lessons on caring for people was the underlying core value taught through this project. Children created the squares, women of the community sewed these together and made them into lap-quilts. These quilts went to people who face different hardships and are in need of a comforting gesture from the community.





# Landscaping at Jack Allen Recreation Complex

Awarded: \$15,000

Total Project Value: \$28,164

The Parks and Recreations Department of the City of Decatur was unable to complete landscape after building their new Recreation Complex. The funds were needed to complete the landscaping which would make the complex more appealing to visitors.

Wheeler Wildlife Refuge

Awarded: \$2,675

Total Project Value: \$5,730.37

The Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge celebrated their 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. The funds provided free educational programs for the

public during the event.

The Council's Annual Plan of Work is developed as an operational and management tool based upon the 2012-2017 Area Plan.

#### **Statement of Vision and Mission**

The Mission of the Alabama's Mountains, Rivers and Valleys (AMRV) Resource and Conservation and Development Council is to improve the quality of life of the residents in its area by the reasonable and responsible protection and development of the natural and human resources of the Tennessee Valley.

- To develop the natural and human resources of the area to meet the economic and social needs of its people
- To assist rural areas and small towns in obtaining adequate housing and adequate water and sanitary systems.
- To develop public recreational projects, programs, and facilities.
- To preserve, develop and maintain game and fish habitat
- To improve forest management
- To implement conservation programs, projects, and policies that reduce flooding, pollution and soil erosion.
- To establish and improve industries that process and market products from natural resources.
- To increase income from agricultural lands by improved cropping methods and livestock enterprises.

These eight goals outlined in 1973 are still viable. Much progress has been made over the last forty years. As the needs and the challenges evolve RC&D is ready to act. Much progress is yet to me made.
